


Altar Rail Offerings for the month of September are for Wellroot Family Services

Music Notes

"O For a Closer Walk with God" by William Cowper (1731-1800)

Mr. William Cowper, a popular poet of the eighteenth century, was also known for his hymn writing. Cowper wrote "O For a Closer Walk With God", "There Is a Fountain Filled with Blood" as well as the well known verse, "God Moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform", from "Light Shining into Darkness."

Life wasn't easy for Mr. Cowper who lived through difficult times long before he was an accomplished poet. William Cowper was the only child of a church rector and his wife. His his mother gave birth to his brother, John. Shortly after John's birth, his mother passed away. His Uncle Robert and his wife stepped in to help with the raising of the two boys. The family shared the love of reading and literature with William, and he was well prepared for school. His father sent him to boarding school at the age of ten (10).

After Cowper's early days at boarding school, William was placed in training for a career in law near the home of his Uncle Robert. There he fell in love with his cousin, Theodora. Uncle Robert would not allow them to marry which led to William falling into a serious mental depression. He was hospitalized and not able to complete the law exam for which he had prepared.

After William's recovery and release from the hospital, he met an older couple, Morley and Mary Unwin, a retired clergyman and his wife. The Unwins offered to house him for a couple of weeks. William ended up living with the Unwins for twenty-two years, and Mary became a second mother to him. Later on, they all moved to Olney where William met and worked with John Newton (Amazing Grace composer). William and John Newton worked on a new hymnbook, "Olney Hymns", published in 1779. That is the first hymnbook to print Cowper's hymn, "There Is a Fountain Filled with Blood."

Mr. Unwin died suddenly in a horse accident, parents had lost five of his infant siblings before but Mrs. Unwin continued to be a mother figure to William. When she became very sick in 1769 and her condition was grave, William wrote, "O For a Closer Walk with Thee." Mary recovered, and she lived twenty-seven years longer, passing away in 1796. This was another difficult time for William, and it is said that he never fully recovered from the loss. He continued to write his poetry and served the Lord.

> William Cowper wrote many poems, hymns, translations of Homer's works, and other Greek literature translations. There are beautiful church windows in St. George's Chapel at Westminster Abbey, the chapel of St. Thomas of Canterbury, and St. Peter's Church in Berkhamsted in William Cowper's memory.
